You're bringing hope to hard-hit believers in Syria

Many people have fled war-ravaged Syria, but Pastor Abdallah has chosen to stay and serve by turning his church into a Centre of Hope.

When asked why, he explains:

"Families are confused about their future. They're without jobs, their houses are destroyed or damaged. There are so many challenges. They're confused whether they should stay or leave. We need to encourage the Christians to stay in this land. As a church, we want to stand next to the people and help them. We want to see a better future."

Thanks to the support of partners like you, Open Doors' projects, like the Centre of Hope, are helping to provide practical support to hard-hit families, including activities for their traumatised children – "the generation that got hurt the most in this war," says Pastor Abdallah. "We want to support and strengthen young children psychologically and spiritually and remove the side effects of war."

Through your support we can help provide food distribution, English lessons, evangelistic Alpha courses, marriage courses, discipleship for new believers, and women's fellowship meetings through these Centres of Hope and more.

Our long-term commitment at Open Doors is to be there for the Church in Syria, for as long as they need us, with whatever support they need. They haven't given up and neither should we – their global Church family.

That's one reason why we've launched our Never Alone Campaign. We want to stand with these hard-hit believers in Syria and all Christians around the world under greatest threat. Read more on pages 6 and 7 on how you can be involved with the Never Alone Campaign this summer!

In **December**, the *Never Alone* Campaign will bring you the stories of the **children** of the persecuted Church... the little light-bearers in the Kingdom. These are our sons and daughters in the faith.

Syria has been caught in a civil war since 2011. The flood of foreign jihadist fighters and Islamic State rule in 2014 added to the persecution of Christians. Although Islamic extremists have since lost control, in some areas they still force Christians to pay protection money, follow a strict dress code and dietary rules, and won't allow believers to express their faith publicly.

Some church leaders are targets for abduction. Believers from a Muslim background face opposition from their community and families, and it's illegal for these Christian converts to marry.

Despite the risks, many Christians and church leaders have chosen to stay in Syria to serve their communities as the civil war continues.

Men under fire in Southeast Asia

Mohd Hassan* in Southeast Asia is a former Muslim who became a Christian.

When his five brothers wanted to kill him because of his conversion, he prayed, "Lord you've chosen me, now please save me!"

He says he was *"persecuted, but never alone,"* as the Lord touched his father's heart, causing him to beg his other children not to kill Mohd.

Today, Mohd works with Open Doors to help persecuted Christians. His family may have disowned him, but he knows that wherever he goes he still *"has his brothers and sisters in Christ."* We asked him a few questions:

Mohd, how has persecution changed in Southeast Asia?

Because more people are coming to Christ, the persecution is rising. Many hide their faith to avoid the persecution.

What kind of persecution do men in your region face?

Many are experiencing:

- Isolation from family.
- Loss of their jobs (most believers live in poverty and work as day labourers because they don't get work when they're Christians).
- The persecution of their children.
- People trying to destroy their houses and grab their land.
- False accusations being made to the police.

How can we pray for you?

Pray that God will raise more people to evangelise and for them to not be afraid. Pray also for the safety of the evangelists and unity among churches.

Persecution against men:

- Denied certain jobs
- Exploited or abused by employer
- Socially ostracised (in areas where they're dependent on their community for survival)
- Physical violence
- Imprisonment
- Militia/military conscription



Persecution against children:

- Girls: forced marriages, rape, house arrest and even death
- Boys: militia/military conscription as a tool of religious persecution
- Bullying by other non-Christian children and even teachers
- Given lower grades at school because of their faith
- Physical violence
- Seeing loved ones arrested or killed for following Jesus
- Witness persecution of parents
- Orphaned

Persecution against women:

- Lack of access to education
- Lack of healthcare or infrastructure
- Forced divorce
- Travel bans

- Incarceration in a psychiatric unit
- Forced abortions or contraception
