Cecilia may have lost her husband in 2011 (when attacks against Christians broke out in the Plateau State), but she and her family are painfully aware of the empty seat at their Christmas table every year. Many of us can relate to that feeling this Christmas.

Cecilia didn't know what would happen to her and her family, but she "decided to hold on to Jesus." And by God's grace, she was able to take care of her family.

Thanks to her family in faith around the world, like you, she was able to provide food for her family and send her children to school. Because of you, her son, Sele, whose favourite subject is Mathematics, can go to school to study so that when he grows up, he can "be a doctor... I want to save people's lives," says Sele.

Both Sele and Cecilia are grateful for their faith family around the world. "I want to say thank you to the brothers and sisters who

are helping me to pay my school fees. May God bless them," says Sele. Cecilia echoes his statement: "I thank God for Open Doors. They're helping me, especially with Sele. We thank you a lot... especially Sele. After each of his exams, when he receives the results, he asks me if I can call the office (Open Doors) to tell them he came first in his class."

Open Doors was able to surprise Sele with a Christmas gift. He had outgrown his clothes, and his mother didn't have money to buy him new clothes. He received a new formal shirt, trousers, and an illustrated Bible. The joy and surprise he displayed are priceless.

"After the service, we eat and drink together because there are those who don't have money to buy food to celebrate in their homes. So we all come together and share so that everyone has enough. Everyone can celebrate without being left behind or discriminated against."

In Syria, Ahmad (14) and Lian (10) are decorating the Christmas tree. Even though the country has been stuck in a civil war for more than 10 years, remembering that the divine Jesus lived among us gives hope.

"I celebrate Christmas by going to my grandfather's house, and we eat sweets and stuff like that," Lian says. "We put up a tree and eat delicious meals," adds Ahmad. "I go out with my friend. We walk through a Christian street where people put Christmas decorations. We also have lunch at a restaurant," says Ahmad.



Deng

In Laos, Deng (12) and her friends are lighting Christmas candles. The girls don't think about persecution when they prepare for Christmas. "Christmas is the day that Jesus came down on earth to forgive our sins, and it's His birthday," Deng says.

The girls rehearse a dance they plan to perform for Christmas. "We celebrate Christmas by dancing," Deng says: "to show glory to God, sing songs, and worship God with the adults."

Praise the Lord for these children's faith in Christ. This Christmas, as we come together to celebrate Jesus's birth, may we remember the hope that we have in Him and thank Him for forgiving us so that we can spend eternity with Him!

Young and old, near or far – **I pray** that we as the Body of Christ across the world will continue to run the race of faith faithfully and together during this Christmas season and in the coming year.
