Africa has one of the youngest churches in the world, but it's a Church with many enemies that experiences persecution in violent ways. One of these enemies is extremist groups that constantly target believers. Despite this, believers continue to follow the Lord, even at the risk of their own lives.

This is true for believers like Gertrude* (27) from the Democratic Republic of the Congo (DRC), a widow and the sole parent to her and her sister's children after her sister and husband were killed.

The Allied Democratic Forces (ADF) killed her sister in May 2018 and her husband on their farmland in August 2021. They also took Gertrude's 3-year-old son. She sustained injuries during the attack after being shot thrice, twice in her foot and once in her stomach.

"Going up the hill, I got another bullet in the stomach. This is where I lost my strength; I fell to the ground. I could see them take my boy and behead my husband from where I was. When I saw them behead him, I told myself we were all dead. I lost the remaining strength I had," she says.

Even before her husband's death, life was not easy, but at least they had each other. Now life has become even more complicated for Gertrude. But despite it all, Gertrude holds fast to God. She recalls: "If I went far away from God, I would already be dead, and the danger from which God saved me, I have hope that God is present. We all are sojourners on this earth. It is God alone who gives me the strength to be able to bear this pain."

Believers in Africa are remarkably resilient, like Gertrude. They are incredibly courageous and defiantly committed to spreading the Good News of Jesus in their corner of the world. But they are also very vulnerable. That is why they need *you* – their global Church family to unite in prayer and action. We asked Ilia Diadi, senior analyst for freedom of religion and belief in sub-Saharan Africa, a few questions about the situation in the region. He explains about how things have changed in the region, who is behind the attacks and how we're helping.

What did the context look like for **Christians before?**

All countries in sub-Saharan Africa used to be great tourist destinations. But this is no longer possible because in recent years, about 10 years or so, we have seen a drastic deterioration of the security situation in the region and religious freedom is dramatically undermined.

What happened to change things? A deterioration of security. For example, Burkina Faso has a long culture of tolerance. But this has changed. We have seen Christian minorities become a target. Nigeria is another reminder. For 12 years now, northeastern Nigeria is affected by Islamist insurgency.

Who is behind the attacks on Christians? Well, there is an upsurge of religious extremism in sub-Saharan Africa. Radical preaching and teaching have been leading to hostility towards religious minorities such as Christians. The way people are behaving

PERSECUTION IN SUB-SAHARAN AFRICA

Africa is home to some of the world's most persecuted Christians. In sub-Saharan Africa (SSA) alone, violence against Christians is at an all-time high, with our family of faith feeling abandoned.



years is the **median age**, with 62% of the population under 25.

SSA has 16 of the top 20 child marriage countries.





The region has 13 of 20 countries with the **highest Christian persecution** worldwide.

Increase in the Open Doors WWL violence score for all 26 SSA countries, with half in the "extremely high" range.

20% of Christians in Africa live in situations of at least "high" levels of persecution or discrimination for their faith, putting the presence of the Church in SSA in jeopardy.



- 5 170 Christians killed (4 650 in Nigeria alone)
- 1500 Christians sexually violated
- 2714 Christians abducted (2 510 in Nigeria alone)
- 1 212 Christian owned/ utilised properties destroyed

Reporting period: October 2021-September 2022. Confirmed cases only, figures are likely much higher. Each case likely represents several more.
